1. THE NEED FOR UNIVERSITY RESEARCH AGENDA

This document summarizes the Mountains of the Moon University Research priorities for the next 5 years from 2023 to 2028. The development of the university research agenda arises from the need to have a guiding document to help spearhead research at the University. The need for a progressive Research agenda arises from a number of factors:

- The diminishing resources for research at the University and national level,
- 2. Lack of a comprehensive University Research Agenda at present.
- Significant changes in the priorities and policies of major funding agencies both in government and private sector,
- Stiff competition for staff seeking research funds across individual and faculty interests and lack of guidance and clear-cut priorities.

Together, these factors if not addressed will retard the overall research productivity at the University and, therefore, the need to have a consistent agenda with the desire to motivate staff, sustain and improve research productivity and competitiveness at national and international levels.

The agenda will achieve this through identifying flagship projects at MMU and consolidating a research culture at the University by:

- Ensuring a significant annual allocation of funds to the University Research Budget for the themes of the Research Agenda.
- 2. Deliberate moves to motivate researchers at the University pursue additional external funding for the
- 3. Deliberate efforts to attract substantial external funds from donors (private sectors and donor agencies) to the University.
- Promote a conducive environment for collaboration in research for both national and international research partnerships.

2. RESEARCH AGENDA DEVELOPMENT PROCESS

The processes followed the provisions of the MMU research policy section 5.1.3 on Faculty Research Thematic areas

- The Faculty Research Committee in consultation with the staff shall develop a 3 year Research Thematic areas that will feed into the University Research Agenda.
- ii) All Faculty research Thematic areas shall put into consideration the national development priorities and Faculty research priorities as identified by the staff in the Faculty.
- iii) The Faculty Research Thematic areas shall reflect both basic and applied research.
- iv) The Faculty research Thematic areas submitted shall fall into three sections namely:
 - a. Rationale or over view
 - b. Aim of research thematic area
 - c. Major research themes and cross cutting issues

- d. List of topics and contexts of possible investigation. The topical list follows the format of the major theme areas noted in (c).
- v) Once the Faculty Research thematic area is approved by the School Board it shall be presented to the Committee of Graduate Studies and Research for approval.

Additionally, this research agenda has been developed tailored to the Mountains of the Moon University Strategic plan and the University Research Policy. Also this research agenda has been aligned to the Uganda National Development plan III, The Uganda Vision 2040, The EAC Vision 2050 The Africa Agenda 2063 and the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs).
